## Easter to Christmas

I am always urging people to at least produce one hard copy of their family history, and by the way there is one important note to make when you do - your computer file name should be printed on the hard copy - if you use a "header and/or a footer" you should include in that the file name. Why, because tomorrow if I step out in front of a city council bus and my life is terminated someone needs to know where to find that valuable family history. It is just one of those items other family members need to know. Wrapped up in all 50+ members of our group is a very large tome of information on people - just imagine if we brought all that paper information together it would probably equal 30 reams of paper. Try stacking six boxes of five reams one on top of the other. So why my heading? Because Easter is already behind us, and I have proposed to the Waikanae Chartered Club that we have an open day on Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> August, not just for Family History, and on that day I would like to see us demonstrate to visitors just how much family history we have on paper. We as members collectively and physically possess a great deal, but more precisely just how important to our community a library of all this "stuff" could be. And time flies so it could soon be Christmas but I want us to make the most of our time doing this "stuff", that is why our group exists and we are here to help.

# That Hard Copy

This is repetitious, and between now and August 6<sup>th</sup> we need a hard copy from as many as can be pressured into producing one. Some already have one, I have three, but if you need guidance then I am here to help you - if you have Family Tree Maker for example you can produce an "outline descendant" for segments of your whole family. Don't try to do the whole tree in one outline or you will be faced with printing 90 pages +. It will be much simpler to look through, if you do one for each sibling of your mother or father for example, help will be readily available. Then we can punch your printout and put it into a binder for display. We will use four ring binders or presentation binders because they will preserve your copy better than others especially when being handled. If you need help we can provide it without delay.

# TOUGH TIMES By George Warcup

We always knew that one of our ancestors was a convict. This story has been passed down to me from family members in various forms and I have endeavoured with some research to add a little more to our knowledge.

On the 28<sup>th</sup> of October 1830 John Pickering an apprenticed carpenter aged 20 stood in the dock of London's Old Bailey indicted for stealing three saws and two planes altogether to the value of thirteen shillings. He was found guilty and sentenced to a whipping and six months imprisonment.

John Pickering was my mother's great-grandfather. John was born in 1810 and baptised in the Soin Chapel Old Street Whitechapel London the son of Matthew and Agnes Pickering. The Pickering's lived in the East End of London.

My mother's maiden name was Myrtle Rose Hazlewood and she was the daughter of George and Grace Hazlewood. George in his turn was a son of William Hazlewood and Emily Pickering, and Emily was a daughter of John Pickering and Ann Watchorn.

Just under two years later our John was in the Old Bailey again this time accused of stealing another plane to the value of two shillings to which he pleaded guilty and so on the 12<sup>th</sup> of April 1832 was sentenced to seven years transportation.

Tasmanian records tell us that on the 7<sup>th</sup> of April 1833 John now convict 56263 arrived in Hobart Tasmania on the convict ship Surrey. Eleven years later in 1844 John Pickering aged thirty four married seventeen year old Ann Watchorn.

Ann was aged eight when she arrived in Hobart with her family on the 24<sup>th</sup> of January 1837. Ann's father Thomas Watchorn was a widower aged fifty when he brought his eight children to Tasmania on the ship William Metcalfe. Thomas, a bounty immigrant was an agricultural labourer. Bounty Immigrants were free men and were given free passage to Tasmania the ship's captain being paid a bounty for the number passengers that he delivered in good order and condition. The Watchorn's are believed to have come from Holme Pierrepont in Nottinghamshire. There is a Watchorn Street in Hobart, named after a mayor John Watchorn who was probably one of Ann's brothers.

The first of John and Ann's children Matthew was born in Tasmania in 1848 and Emily my Great grandmother was born in New Zealand in 1852 followed by another three children all born in New Zealand. This tells us that during the four year gap 1848/52 our Pickering family immigrated to New Zealand from Tasmania.

The Pickering family settled in Wellington, where in 1871 Emily aged 20 married William Hazlewood aged 26 in Wellington. William and Emily raised ten children including my Grandfather George Hazlewood, all born in Wellington. George married Grace Elizabeth Free 1903 and they had five children. My mother Myrtle Rose Hazlewood born in Wellington in 1905 was their eldest daughter and she married my father Herbert Montague Warcup in 1931

Great-great-grandfather John Pickering lived out his life in Wellington and in later years appeared to suffer from alcoholism being arrested for numerous related offences and died in 1891. Great-grandfather William Hazlewood died tragically in a boating accident in Evans Bay on New Year's Day 1897. Emily died in Wellington in May 1898 her death certificate stating of Tuberculosis and Exhaustion.

Some bride's names: Johnston, Fox, Allan, Gay, Chambers, Rees, Knigge.

# CLANN special issue SEVEN 1916 PROCLAMATION SIGNATORIES

One hundred years ago, the 1916 Easter Rising, it is now the anniversary of that momentous event and Clann have published the family history of the seven signatures to that uprising. It is available printed out for some lucky members to borrow and read, it is just 52 pages. Thus began the separation of Ireland and Britain, claim the copy before it goes on the table at the next meeting.

# **SURNAME FORMS & FAMNET**

So far only three people have responded to the plea to complete surname forms – not enough out of fifty members we need more than that although only half that number were present at the last meeting. For those who are not up with the play, you complete one of these forms with as many of your family names as you can muster, - don't worry if you miss some – we publish them in the FamNet database and then other people get the chance to see who you are researching. Your contact details are on the system and if anyone spies a name that also appears in their family history then you could hear from them.

FamNet is a huge database of 15 million plus entries to which every member of our group is a "paid" up member courtesy of your committee. During 2015 we sought funding from the local body and paid up the membership for all our members and in 2016 we have done it again. Initially we have used up part of our funds to meet the first two or three months of this 2016 year, we applied for funding which will take us through to August 2017.
